These principles are called the "foundations" of the Christian faith. They are the basic doctrines on which the Christian faith rests. The first of these principles is "repentance from dead works. If we are to fully understand the meaning of repentance, we must understand what it is from which we are to repent. We must understand "dead works." "Dead works" are the actions of a life lived apart from God. These works may be wrong deeds or acts of self-righteousness. These are called "sin" in the Bible. The basic thing that causes sin is selfishness. It is the

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love of self as opposed to the love of God. This love of self-results in man going "his own way" All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned everyone to his own way... (Isaiah 53:6) Jesus died for the sins of men in order that they should not henceforth live unto themselves, but unto Him which died for them and rose again. (II Corinthians 5:15) When you repent from these dead works of selfishness it means you acknowledge the existence of the one true God, realize you are a sinner, ask forgiveness of your sin, and accept God's plan of salvation through Jesus Christ. does it profit, my brethren, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can faith save him? If a brother or sister is naked and destitute of daily food, and one of you says to them, "Depart in peace, be warmed and filled," but you do not give them the things which are needed for the body, what does it profit? Thus also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead. But someone What will say, "You have faith, and I have works." Show me your faith without your works, and I will show you my faith by my works. You believe that there is one God. You do well. Even the demons believe-and tremble! But do you want to know, O foolish man, that faith without works is dead? Was not Abraham our father justified by works when he offered Isaac his son on the altar? Do you see that faith was working together with his works, and by works faith was made perfect? And the Scripture was fulfilled which says,

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"Abraham believed God, and it was accounted to him for righteousness." And he was called the friend of God. You see then that a man is justified by works, and not by faith only (James 2:14-26, NKJV). Likewise, was not Rahab the harlot also justified by works when she received the messengers and sent them out another way? For as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also. "Dead works" are caused by an idolatry of the heart that is seldom detected and seldom dealt with effectively. The result is that we aren't experiencing the closeness to God that is possible for each of us-and we hardly even realize it. Has your love for God become lukewarm, or even cold? We are much more independent When God becomes our refuge and strength His closeness to us has become our reason for being secure and confident-not material things, not our job, our house, our money, our appearance, what we know, what we do, not the church we attend, not the acceptance and approval of people, not our personality, not our ministry, not our family, not even the (good and important) doctrines that we believe.

No More Separation discusses the definition and importance of grace with biblical support and real-life application. The book discusses the misunderstandings of grace and clarifies God's Word. Grace is the enemy of religious self-righteousness. Many people misunderstand the undeserved favor of God that we

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call "grace," but it is a key element in understanding God's plans for our lives. Grace is the key element and the distinguishing characteristic that separates the New Covenant from the Old Covenant. The book addresses the objections to pure grace without Law works. King David thanked God for his afflictions because they taught him God's truths. Similarly, the Apostle Paul confessed that he had learned to trust God through his afflictions. Although God can take depression and other forms of suffering away, He often uses them to produce His best fruit. This book will help us to embrace God's work and to dance in step with it. The way we think about God largely determines how we feel about Him. While an incorrect understanding will mar our sense of intimacy with Him, a Biblical understanding of God provides

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fertile soil for growth through pain and depression. These principles are vividly demonstrated through the author's various missteps as God brought him out of a dungeon of dysfunction. The final section of the book contrasts the Biblical perspective with secular theory and practice. Embracing the Darkness is largely based upon the seminar, "Biblical Principles for Handling Depression and Despair."

This book is an discussion of six aspects of "self" self-deception, self-righteousness, self-examination, self-suspicion, self-love, and self-denial. Maguire recommends using the Bible as a mirror to examine oneself and to prevent self-deception. He includes hints to detect self-righteousness. He distinguishes self-love from selfishness. He recommends healthy self-suspicion to keep watchful. He explains self-denial in principal and in practice. Maguire's purpose: "It is the great business of man, as more largely set forth in the subsequent pages-to detect, to correct, to examine, to suspect, to love, and to deny this Self of his, so that it may one day be rendered back, with acceptance and approval, to the God who gave it." Rev. Robert Maguire D. D. (1826-1890) was born in Dublin, Ireland. He graduated with honors from Trinity College, Dublin. He was a Rector at St. James, Clerkenwell and then St. Olave, Southwark. He was an evangelical, a temperance worker, and a very popular

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speaker. He wrote many books including "The Miracles of Christ", "Lyra Evangelica: Hymns Original and Selected" and "Expository Lectures on The Pilgrims Progress".

The gospel story comes with great insights (from the Bible itself) into prophecies that were fulfilled and key doctrines or concepts that should be understood by every Christian. The book ends with 14 Appendices explaining from the Scriptures some of those doctrines (Salvation, Sabbath, Kingdom of God, Trinity,

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Self Righteousness, Tithing, Rapture, and others). All Bible quotations are from the King James Version of the Bible carefully modified by the author to reflect modern English. The feature that makes this book unique is that the individual verses were carefully merged together with each reference included. The specific book, chapter, verse reference brings confidence to readers, and allows for easy verification. After assembling the story from the four gospels in English, the author took the Spanish version of Reina Valera Gmez and assembled it in Spanish. He then compared the results of the two efforts (English and Spanish) and that helped identify a few areas that needed improvement that otherwise, could not be detected through normal editing efforts. As a result, the author is extremely confident in the work presented in this book. You can read the Bible to figure out what the four gospels say about Joseph of Arimathea, or you could read the Assembled Gospel and get it all together. See it from the Assembled Gospel's perspective. "Mat 27:57-58 - Mark 15:42-45 - Luke 23:50-52 - John 19:38 And now when the afternoon arrived, there came a rich man of Arimathea, a city of the Jews: named Joseph, and he was a good and just man, an honorable counselor, who also himself waited for the kingdom of God. He had not consented to the advice and actions of them; being a disciple of Jesus, but secretly, for fear of the Jews. Because it was the preparation, that is, the day

Combating the sin of selfishness requires that we learn the art of humility, which restores and grows relationships. Romans 12:10 says, "Be kindly affectionate to one another with brotherly love, in honor giving preference to one another; not lagging in diligence, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord; rejoicing in hope, patient in tribulation, continuing steadfast in prayer, distributing to the needs of the saints, given to hospitality." Selfishness to Selflessness is a journey from the bondages of selfishness to being free through selflessness (Christ-likeness). It is my prayer that this book ministers to your spirit, unleashing the gift of humility that resides deep within the heart of every believer. He starts with the core tasks of shaping the proposal, finding the hook, and building the narrative or argument, and then turns to the hard work of executing the plan and establishing a style. *Developmental Editing* includes detailed case studies featuring a variety of nonfiction books—election-year polemic, popular science, memoir, travel guide—and authors ranging from first-timer to veteran, journalist to scholar. Handy

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sidebars offer advice on how to become a developmental editor, create effective illustration programs, and adapt sophisticated fiction techniques (such as point of view, suspense, plotting, character, and setting) to nonfiction writing. Norton's book also provides freelance copyeditors with a way to earn higher fees while introducing more creativity into their work lives. It gives acquisitions, marketing, and production staff a vocabulary for diagnosing a manuscript's flaws and techniques for transforming it into a bestseller. And perhaps most importantly, Developmental Editing equips authors with the concrete tools they need to reach their audiences.

The letter to the Romans presents the most constantly sustained depths of biblical

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teaching available in all of the Scriptures. To master the contents of Romans is to master the truths of the Christian faith. The essential message is that no amount of self-righteousness will qualify a person for God's favor. The theme of the letter to the Romans is declared clearly by its author, the Apostle Paul: "For I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes, to the Jew first and also to the Greek. For in it the righteousness of God is revealed from faith to faith; as it is written, 'But the righteous man shall live by faith.'" (Romans 1:16-17). This profound truth is enough to quicken the soul lost in traditions, legalism and externals and establish it completely on the saving work of Jesus Christ. It has served as the stimulus for revivals and reformations, and continues to stir hearts lost in sin to faith and salvation. The book of Romans is divided into four sections all of which concentrate of a differing aspect of the Gospel of God's grace. The first section in Volume 1 analyzes the indictment through the Gospel under which all men exist in sin (1-3); the second section announces the intervention of the Gospel through justification (4-8); in Volume 2 the third section affirms the intention of the Gospel through grace (9-11); and the fourth section calls for attentiveness to the impact of the Gospel (12-16).

I truly believe with great conviction that the Bible teaches that Christians of all dispensations should avoid using alcohol as a beverage. Before you judge this conclusion, read the book. I only ask that you come to the topic with an open mind, as I did. You may be surprised what God will do in your heart if you trust totally in what He

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has to say. While I will take a strong and unambiguous stand in this book against alcoholic beverages in all forms, I want to make it perfectly clear that I write from love and concern, not from self-righteousness and arrogance. I truly believe that this is a serious matter. I want my detractors to know that I love them, regardless of their conclusions. This book is written with Christians in mind. While I would love to see this book influence any reader to give up the bottle (or the glass), I especially hope and pray that Bible-believing Christians will rise to a higher standard of holiness, and have a greater impact for Christ, as well as a more sober, fulfilling life. I challenge you to let Jesus be to you what wine is to too many; the gladness of your heart. May God bless you as you take this journey with me.

MOST religious books are "sugar coated" and non-controversial. But, the Bible isn't that way. Neither is 'Jesus Drank, Judas Repented and God Divorced His Bride.' If you do an objective study of the contents of the Bible, you'll discover that God can be quite a difficult God. While much of Christ's popularity came from the miracles he performed, those in power took notice because of his

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understanding of Hebrew law (Old Testament) and his outspoken intolerance for arrogance and self-righteousness among the "religious" crowd. Reading this book will force you to re-evaluate your understanding of the bible.

If righteousness is right-standing with God, then self-righteousness must be it's greatest enemy. In the story of Job, we find an interesting illustration of how self-righteousness evolves and opens the door to the enemy in our lives. Job had strong convictions and he wasn't afraid to stand by them, yet his friend eventually asked, "Do you think this is right? Do you say, 'My righteousness is more than God's?'" And in a surprise visit, the Lord appears and asks His own questions: "Why do you confuse the issue? Why do you talk without knowing what you're talking about?" The Bible is clear. God is addressing Job here, no one else. But wait— isn't Job the same man God calls "blameless"? What happened? Is it possible what God meant and what man has interpreted for centuries are two different things? People have often claimed, "God said Job didn't sin so he couldn't have been wrong." This isn't true. What the Bible actually says is, "In all of this, Job did not sin by blaming God," and "In all this Job did not sin with his lips." These are very clear descriptions of how Job didn't sin, but they are just as clear in how he slipped. People sin every day and never blame God for their actions. And the most dangerous of all sins are those of the

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heart, the sins that never cross our lips but build up under the surface just waiting for an opportunity to explode. This is the story of the man who challenged God—the man God originally called blameless. But was he? Are any of us? What we know for sure is, the Lord used the story of Job to illustrate His never-ending mercy and compassion to cover our sins and teach us His ways.

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
